Our internal D& I staff team is working hard to develop and execute programs that makeour sport more inviting for underrepresented populations.

Why is this important? Because the demographics of the USAare changing rapidly and dramatically. From an ethnic perspective, USA Swimmingmembership is predominantly Caucasian. According to the US CensusBureau, by 2044, that group will comprise less than 50% of the nation'spopulation. If USA Swimming is to sustain its position as the most successfulOlympic sport in this country, our membership must better reflect the changingdemographics of the nation.

In fact, the need to be more inclusive goes beyondprotecting the long-term success of the sport. For those of us that are devotedswimming enthusiasts, inclusion is also about sharing this great sport, and allof the positive things that it does for young people, with groups that havenot traditionally participated. We want more people to share the benefitsas well as contribute to the overall experience enjoyed by all.

As I write this introduction, we are literally days awayfrom the start of the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro. For the first time ever, the US Olympic Swim Team includes two African American women, Lia Neal and Simone Manuel. Both young ladies



serve as pioneers and role models for current and futuregenerations and both have participated in USA Swimming programs designed topromote diversity and inclusion. They are great ambassadors for the sport and llook forward to cheering for their continued success in Rio. Go USA!

Diversity Spotlight - U.S. Olympic Team Trials - Swimming An African American Parent's Perspective

What were the best moments?

Over the last couple of weeks I have been asked that question byswim coaches, friends and coworkers. My viewpoint is different than most because I didn't grow up swimming. I learned how to swim in college. In my opinionthere where many moments at this year's U.S. Olympic Swim Trials to cheer andcelebrate the sport of swimming, a sport that I have come to enjoy and respect. Just like everyone in attendance I clappedand cheered when Michael Phelps swam his last race and marveled at KatieLedeckeys continued swimming dominance. Themoment that made me pause was when Simone Manuel and Lia Neal made the U.S.Olympic Swim Team. For the first time inswimming history two African American women earned a spot on the swim team at the same time. Think about that. First time EVER!

To fully understand and recognize the importance of SimoneManuel and Lia Neal earning a spot on the U.S. Olympic Swim Team one has tolook back at the history of African Americans in swimming. AfricanAmericans have been competing in swimming for decades. Some have comedose to making the Olympic Team. Over 20 years ago Byron Davis missedqualifying for the Olympics by three-tenths of a second. At the 2000Summer Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia Anthony Ervin became the first person of AfricanAmerican descent to medal in swimming. 2004 marked another milestone asMaritza Correia McClendon became the first black woman to make the United StatesOlympic Swim Team. The breakthrough for people of color continued when Cullen Jones earned a spot on the Olympic Swim Team in 2008.

Last year Simone Manuel and Lia Neal along with NatalieHinds set a milestone by becoming the first African American swimmers tosweep the 100 yard freestyle event at the NCAA National Championships.

Simone Manuel and Lia Neal earning a spot on the U.S. OlympicSwim Team is a seminal moment in swimming history. African American boysand girls will now see athletes that "look like them" swim in theOlympics. This may encourage them to join a swim team and become the nextSimone Manuel, Lia Neal, or Maritza Correia McClendon. As an AfricanAmerican father of four young girls who love swimming I couldn't help but thinkof my girls when Simone and Lia made the Olympic Team. Maybe one of my girls will become an Olympian one day.



Congratulations to Simone Manuel and Lia Neal and the rest ofthe athletes that made the U.S. Olympic Swim team.
