# Four Individual World Titles for U.S. at FINA World Swimming Championships (25m) 

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MELBOURNE, Australia - Night three of competition on Thursday saw four United States swimmers capture individual gold medals at the FINA World Swimming Championships ( 25 m ) at the Melbourne Sports and Aquatic Centre (MSAC). The women's 4x50m freestyle relay set American and Championship records en route to the gold medal.

Semifinals for the 50 m backstroke and 100 m individual medley also took place Thursday evening. Claire Curzan (Cary, N.C./Stanford University/TAC Titans) advances to Friday's final as the top seed, setting an American record with her time of 25.60. Ryan Murphy (Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla./California Aquatics) was the second overall qualifier to Friday's backstroke final. Hunter Armstrong (Dover, Ohio/California Aquatics) will compete in a 50 m backstroke swim-off on Friday morning for the last spot in the final.

Michael Andrew (Encinitas, Calif./MA Swim Academy) and Shaine Casas (McAllen, Texas/Longhorn Aquatics) earned the top two seeds, respectively, in Friday's IM final.

Prelims continue Friday at 11:05 a.m. AEDT ( $6: 05$ p.m. ET, December 14) with finals at 7:35 p.m. AEDT (3:35 a.m. ET, December 15). Swimmers from 160 countries will compete across 46 events through December 18.

Fifth - Torri Huske (Arlington, Va./Stanford University), 52.04
Eighth - Natalie Hinds (Midlands, Texas/Gator Swim Club), 52.24
Women's 200 m Butterfly - FINAL

GOLD - Dakota Luther (Austin, Texas/Longhorn Aquatics), 2:03.37
SILVER - Hali Flickinger (York, Pa./Sun Devil Swimming), 2:03.78

Luther on her race: "I was a little out of my element in short course meters but I felt really great. I had an awesome time racing Hali (Flickinger) and being under the bright lights with the USA flag on my cap was a great experience."

Race Notes:

- Luther becomes the first American female to win the 200 m butterfly (SCM) world title since Mary Descenza in 2008.
- Luther's time of 2:03.37 is a new personal best and makes her the third-fastest American performer in the event's history.
- Luther's win marks her first world championship title.

## Women's 100m Breaststroke - FINAL

GOLD - Lilly King (Evansville, Ind./Indiana Swim Club), 1:02.67

King on her race: "I tried to go out really fast, and I went out pretty fast but wasn't the fastest out. Then I just tried to hang on for dear life the second 50 (meters) and it worked, so it was good."

Race Notes:

- First world title in the event for the U.S. since Rebecca Soni in 2010.
- First world title in the event for King, who won silver in the event in 2016.
- King's time was 0.17 off her personal best.


## Men's 100m Breaststroke- FINAL <br> GOLD - Nic Fink (Morristown, N.J./Metro Atlantic Aquatic Club), 55.88

Fink on his race: "It was a stacked field and the middle of the meet. It was good to keep the momentum going for Team USA. I saw Lilly (King) won the race before me and it's all about momentum. Just trying to keep it up for the team."

Fink on swimming multiple events on multiple days: "It's funny. I feel like I'm swimming a lot, but then I look at what Torri (Huske) or Claire Curzan are swimming and they have like three swims in a session for two or three sessions in a row and it's insane. I just try to put it in perspective. My one race tonight is not going to kill me either way. It's doable."

Fink on winning the world title: "It means a lot. I was able to get the other two last year and completing the set - as (the announcer) was saying - is kind of fun and it's giving me confidence to defend the next two."

Race Notes:

- The time is Fink's third performance ever under 55.9, a mark that only three other Americans have ever breached.

Smith on his race: "That race was fantastic. It felt really strong from the start. I felt a lot of confidence when I built such a big lead at the 200, then I was fighting on the last 100 but I got it done."

Smith on winning gold: "It is the first time that I have been at the top of the podium so it's a new chapter in my career. It was an exciting race and I knew that those guys were going to be tough but I was ready."

Race Notes:

- Smith joins Chad Carvin as the only American to ever win the event.
