4:12.4 and Konrads' 4:21.8. Ian Black of Britain also was clocked in 4:21.8 for fourth. Alan Somers of Indianapolis, who had paced the qualifiers with a record 4:19.2, was fifth in 4:22.0. Gene Lenz of Santa Maria, Calif., was seventh in 4:26.8.

1,500-METER FREESTYLE—John Konrads, the 18-year-old Latvian-born Australian, dethroned teammate Murray Rose in a thrilling finish with America's George Breen third. Japan's Tsuyoshi Yamanaka was fourth. Alan Somers was seventh.

The first six broke Breen's Olympic mark of 17:52.9, with Konrads (world record holder in 17:11) timed in 17:19.6, Rose in 17:21.7 and Breen in 17:30.6. Somers, winner of his heat in 17:54.1, did 18:02.8 in the final.

Breen, 25, and the oldest man on the US team, powered his way in front and led until 1,100 meters. Then Konrads churned ahead with Rose never more than a few strokes behind. The two Aussies virtually matched strokes the rest of the way but Rose couldn't cut down the margin.

200-METER BREASTSTROKE—Bill Mulliken of Miami U. of Oxford, Ohio, pulled the big upset in this one—a race the US supposedly didn't figure in. The 6-foot-3, 185-pound redhead who prefers to race against man instead of the clock, turned in his best time ever in winning his heat in 2:38.0. The 21-year-old then paced the semi-finalists in 2:37.2 and won

the final with his usual stretch drive in Olympic record time of 2:37.4. It was the first US victory in this stroke since 1948. Japan's Yoshihiko Ohsaki was second in 2:38.0 and Germany's Wieger Menonides third in 2:39.7. Paul Hait of San Jose, Calif., was eighth in 2:41.4.

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200-METER BUTTERFLY—Mike Troy, who had been steadily chopping down the world record, tore another big chunk out of it in winning in 2:12.8. Neville Hayes, Australia's 16-year-old phenom, just nipped Dave Gillanders of Michigan in the last few strokes for second. Hayes was timed in 2:14.6 and Gillanders in 2:15.3.

100-METER BACKSTROKE—David Thiele, Australia's 22-year-old medical student, came out of retirement to repeat his 1956 triumph. Bob Bennett, 17-year-old Californian, posted the best time in the prelims but in the final it was the pace-setting Thiele all the way with another Olympian, Frank McKinney of Indianapolis, second by about two feet. Thiele eclipsed his Olympic record by three-tenths of a second in 1:01.9. McKinney was second in 1:02.1, also under the record, and Bennett third in 1:02.3. Australia's world record holder, John Monckton (1:01.5), was seventh in 1:04.1.

800-METER (4 x 200) FREESTYLE RELAY—The US sent Bill Darnton, Tom Winters, Steve Clark and George Harrison out to qualify and they broke the listed world record with 8:18.0 after Japan had cracked it with 8:17.1.

In the final Harrison, Dick Blick, Troy and Farrell cut it down to 8:10.2 in copping the gold medal by about 6 meters over Japan (8:13.2) and defender Australia, third in 8:13.8.

It was the 6-foot-5 Blick who broke up this race. Harrison picked up about a meter on his man and then Blick streaked to a 7-meter lead on his leg. Troy, going for his double gold, held most of the margin against Japan's Yamanaka and Australia's Rose, and Farrell added to it.

400-METER (4 x 100) MEDLEY RELAY—Bob Bennett, backstroke, Paul Hait, breaststroke, Dave Gillanders, butterfly, and Steve Clark, freestyle, warmed up the pool with a world record 4:08.2 in the qualifying heat of this new Olympic event. Then McKinney (1:02.0), Paul Hait (1:10.5), Larson (1:58.0) and Farrell (1:54.9) brought it down to 4:05.4 in romping off with the final by about 15 meters. Australia was second in 4:12.0 and Japan third in 4:12.2.

Larson broke this one open with a scintillating 58-second leg which gave Farrell a 7-meter lead. Jeff, in his farewell, blazed the fastest 100 in the Games to stretch the margin. Some clockers caught him in :54.8, only two-tenths of a second off Devitt's world mark.

SPRINGBOARD DIVING—Gary Tobian came through with a series of spectacular, high-point performances on his last three plunges to capture the crown. The 25-year-old from Glendale, Calif., beat teammate Sam Hall



to 141.24 for Paula Jean Pope of Santa Ana, Calif., who started off poorly.

Miss Kramer closed out her big upset by scoring 19.44 points—highest for one dive in the competition—on her 10th and final plunge, a brilliant reverse 1½ somersault pike. Paula Jean, 25, and in her third Olympics, scored 18.00 on her last plunge. Britain's Elizabeth Ferris was third on 139.09 to provide her country with its first diving medal in 36 years. Pat Willard, 19, of Mesa, Ariz., finished fourth with 137.82.

10-METER PLATFORM DIVING—Ingrid Kramer made it a double slam by capturing the platform title with 91.28 points to Paula Jean Pope's 88.94. Russia's Ninel Krutova was third with 86.99 to give the Soviet its only medal of the aquatic program for both sexes. Juno Stover Irwin, 31-year-old mother of four and competing in her fourth Olympics, was fourth with 83.59.

Fraulein Kramer again took a good lead over Paula Jean, who once more fared poorly in the beginning of the 6-dive event. Mrs. Pope made up ground on her fifth plunge but Ingrid clinched her triumph on her last dive, a terrific 1½ forward somersault with double twist that earned her 18.48 points, the highest in this event.
